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# Prominent Pilot 'Jap' Lee Takes Last Flight Above

All flight schedules are canceled, the Log book is closed, and the "Supreme Co-pilot" has taken over the controls. On the 31st anniversary of his first solo flight, death claimed one of Irving's most colorful and respected citizens early Tuesday morning, as he sat quietly reading a book.

Captain T.J. "Jap" Lee had been a top pilot with American Airlines for nearly 27 years, with more than 25,000 flying hours to his credit. He was flying America's DC

6 and DC 7 between Dallas and Los Angeles.

Born in Taylor, Texas in 1899, Lee came to Dallas where he attained his education in the public schools. He worked as stock clerk in a department store, then turned to auto mechanics. In 1920 he fulfilled his ambition and became an aviation mechanic. In 1921 he joined the Emerson Flying Circus and on December 6 he took his first solo flight. Airplanes and "Jap"

Lee were inseparable and he "barnstormed" about the country and gave flight instructions

at Love Field until 1927. In December of that year, he formed the Kentucky Airways at Lexington and a year later he was flying the mail between Cleveland and Louisville for a company which was pre-decessor of American Airlines.

"Jap", as Lee is affectionately known, has carried the nickname since childhood. It was given him by his sister Viola, who couldn't pronounce his name "Jasper". The children were orphaned at an early age.

Jap Lee has been a prominent figure in Irving's civic and school activities, and noted as a man of integrity.

For a number of years, Lee has operated and maintained the Irving Airport, a private strip which adjoins his suburban home on Carpenter Road.

Funeral services have been scheduled for 2:30 p.m. Thursday at Black's Funeral Chapel in Irving. The Rev. C.P. Murphy, a lifelong friend, will be assisted by the Rev. R.S. McKee, pastor of the First Presbyterian Church of Irving, in conducting the rites.

Palbearers will be American Airlines pilots who have flown with him since their early days together as flight engineers. They will be Capt. George J. Kahac, Capt. M.W. Spain, Capt. W.W. Wing, Capt.
