Heart Attack Claims Veteran Salesman

Funeral services were held Friday for W.B. Henley, 75, who died Wednesday in a hotel at DeLeon, following a heart attack.

A veteran salesman Henley was known throughout the state among dry goods merchants. He held one of the longest records of traveling saleswork in Texas, having been on the road

for 51 years.

He died at the Commerce County hotel while traveling for Higginbotham - Bailey Company, whom he had represented since it was organized in 1914.

His traveling career began in 1905, setting a record unmatched in the state, officials at the wholesale dry goods firm said. He came to Texas

from Tennessee.

The Henleys resided on Perch Hill Road when they moved to Irving, and later sold their acreage to a gravel company. At the time of Mr. Henley's death, they lived at 712 Hilltop Road.

Rites were held at Sparkman-Brand Funeral Chapel in Dallas, with interment in Hillcrest Mausoleum. The Rev.

Rites For Father Of W. L. Hoyle

W. L. Hoyle attended funeral services in Arkansas City for his father, David DeWitt Hoyle, 78, who died at his home there, March 17, after a long illness. He had been in a critical condition for three months. Funeral services were held March 15 at Grant-Elder Funeral Home with the Rev. Horrett Lemmon, officiating. Full military services were conducted at the graveside in Memorial Lawn Cemetery.

Hoyle was employed by the Cities Service Co. for many years and had lived in Arkansas City for 17 years where he was well known for his gardening hobby.

Born May 28, 1877 at Elwin, Tennessee, he was the son of Elzira Frankenship and Hiram Solomon Hoyle. He married the former Miss Sadie Roberts, at Sparks, Oklahoma on December 12, 1911, and the couple moved to Winfield in 1913, before making their home in Arkansas City in 1938.

Hoyle was a member of the Southern Baptist Church, U.S.V.W., VFW and Cooties. He was the youngest son of Hiram Solomon Hoyle, a prominent southern figure in church and political circles. He was the childhood companion of Andrew Johnson who succeeded Lincoln as president of the United States, and being a Baptist minister, preached Johnson's funeral service.

A veteran of the Spanish American War, he enlisted in 1898 and served as a private in Company G, 3rd Regiment, Tennessee Infantry, and was discharged on January 31, 1899. He later re-enlisted and served two tours of duty.

Survivors include his wife, 3 sons, W. L. Hoyle of Irving; Fredrick Hoyle of Wichita and Harry Hoyle, Arkansas; one daughter, Mrs. Frank (Emma) Morgan, Walton Indiana; and 9 grandchildren.

Charles L. Langston, prominent in educational circles, died unexpectedly early Friday morning following a heart attack. Funeral services were to be held at 2 PM Saturday in Black's Funeral Chapel with Rev. James T. Bagby, of St. Martin's Episcopal Church, at Tanglewood near Houston, conducting the last rites. Interment in Hillcrest Memorial Cemetery.

Langston joined the Irving Schools as curriculum co-ordinator in 1949. He was well known and respected in educational circles throughout the state.

Feeling that it was his professional duty to keep the schools open, he became acting superintendent during the controversy here last year.

After a year at the Clear Creek Independent School District, Langston was reinstated in the Irving Schools in June, where he was again in the administrative position as assistant superintendent.

Born Oct. 24, 1903 in Silver Creek, Miss., he joined the Baptist church as a child. His first membership was in the second Baptist Church ever built in Mississippi, which was on the Langston family's land. At the time of his death, he was a member of the First Baptist Church of Irving.

He married the former Miss Martha Neale of Denton in 1926 and later moved to Texas where he served as superintendent of schools at Krum, principal of Pleasant Valley School at Amarillo, Director of Industrial Relations at the Certain-Teed Products Corp in

Amarillo during 1940-41.

During World War II, Langston received the Bronze Award for outstanding and meritorious service to his country. He was personnel and industrial relations director for the Burchell Products Co in New York City which had a Navy contract for polaroid lens. In 1943 Mr. Langston went to Oak Ridge, Tenn. as superintendent of industrial relations for the Fercleve Corp. He was the first person hired for this company, which is credited with having actually produced the atomic bomb.

Langston received his bachelor of arts degree from Mississippi College; his MA degree from North Texas State College and worked on his doctor of philosophy at Southern Methodist University, North Texas State College and the University of Texas.

He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Martha Neale Langston; two daughters, Martha Langston Tipps

of Dallas; and Janet Ruth Langston; father, H.V. Langston; and 7 brothers, Kirby, Ralph, Fred, Arno, Ray, Leo and Frank Langston of Mississippi.

Barefoot Lad Gets Fatal Shock Tuesday

A barefoot 11-year-old boy with mud between his toes failed to survive a shock by a 110-volt electric drill Tuesday afternoon.

Ronald William Marshall was pronounced dead on arrival at a Dallas clinic despite efforts of firemen, police, ambulance attendants and other volunteers over a 90-minute period to revive him. An oxygen mask was used in a vain attempt to fan the spark of life.

Funeral services are set for 2 PM Thursday in the Black Funeral Home Chapel, with Rev. E. A. Goldsmith of Calvary Baptist Church officiating.

Burial will follow in Laurel Land, in Dallas under direction of Blacks.

The boy, a fifth-grade student at Sowers Elementary school, had washed the family's blue Kalsor, and had started polishing it with a buffer attached to a hand electric drill.

It could not be determined whether he received the shock from the drill, or by stepping on the cord, as no one saw him when the shock was received.

The boy called out, and his father jerked the plug on the long extension cord inside the house and ran to the boy's side.
