Child Killer Guilty

DUBUQUE, Iowa (UPI) -- Baby sitter Mary Madigan, 29, who squeezed three youngsters to death when she thought they begged her "hold me tighter," was sentenced to eight years in a reformatory Monday.

Judge Eugene F. Keane passed sentence after listening to a psychiatric report by three doctors which said Miss Madigan was technically sane.

The doctors said the 192-pound babysitter had suffered brain damage at birth and had a chronic brain syndrome accompanied by congenital spastic paralysis and mental deficiency.

"Despite these findings, paradoxically," the report said, she was sane, but did not know the degree of harm which would come from her tight clutching of the children.

The manslaughter charge was based on the Aug. 4 death of Gail Nemmers, 3. Gail was the second child of Mr. and Mrs. Wayne Nemmers to die while under Miss Madigan's care.

Police said Miss Madigan admitted holding tightly to Karen Sue Nemmers, 22 months; Michael Fitzpatrick, 4 months, and Gail, before they died.

Fireballer Bobo Newsom, 55, Dies

ORLANDO, Fla. (UPI) -- Louis Norman (Bobo) Newsom, one of the most colorful players in modern baseball history whose fireball pitching often was just as good as he said it was, died Friday at the age of 55.

The death of the 211-game winner, who toiled for a total of nine different clubs during his 22-year career in the big leagues, was attributed to a liver ailment.

Newsom had lived in nearby Winter Park, Fla., since his retirement. He was survived by his widow, Ruth, a daughter, Mrs. Norma Nicolai of Hayward, Calif., and a son, Alan G. Newsom of Coronado, Calif. Funeral arrangements were not yet completed.

Newsom rambled through the major leagues from 1929 until 1953, changing uniforms 17 times and making a few detours to the minor leagues. Once the railroads of America presented him with a humorous award for all the business

he had given them by his travelling.

But if Newsom picked up the nickname "Bobo the Hobo" as a result of his wanderings, he also required the reputation and the record of an excellent pitcher.

He belonged to the exclusive circle of 200-game winners, gaining 200 of those victories in the American League and 11 in the National League. He is the only 20th Century member of that group who lost more games (222) than he won -- yet this figure itself was a tribute to his ability, for he was recognized as a top-grade pitcher despite several years with low-ranked teams.

Newsom was three times a 20-game winner -- winning 20 with the old St. Louis Browns in 1938, 20 again in 1939 with the Browns and Detroit Tigers, and experiencing his greatest year in 1940 with the tigers with 21 victories and only five defeats.

Gen. Neyland Dies at 70

NEW ORLEANS (UP) — Brig. Gen. Robert Reese Neyland, the all-time Army athlete who turned the University of Tennessee into a training academy for the nation's top football coaches, died in a hospital here Wednesday.

The 70-year-old Texan had been a patient at Ochsner Foundation Hospital since Jan. 14, suffering from a variety of illnesses contracted during a colorful military career. He died at 11:30 a.m. a few hours after he lapsed into a coma.

His falling health had forced Neyland to give up the head football coaching job after his big Tennessee team lost to Texas in the 1952 Cotton Bowl. He often joked

that even though he may have been America's winningest coach, he had the poorest bowl record in the business.

He became athletic director and later picked Bowden Wyatt, the captain of his 1938 unbeaten, untied Orange Bowl team as head coach. At one time in his career there were 90 Neyland-trained coaches in the business.

"General Neyland now becomes a legend," Wyatt said after hearing of his death. "To those who knew him best, he was a man of great personal dignity and quiet strength whose devotion to duty and dedication to high ideals was a constant inspiration."
