Cantor Collapses After Ida's Death

BEVERLY HILLS, Calif. — (UPI) — The death Wednesday of Eddie Cantor's wife Ida, after 48 years of marriage left the famed entertainer "overwhelmed" with grief Thursday and under a doctor's care.

Cantor, the goggle-eyed comic who attained stardom in every media of the entertainment industry, collapsed when he learned his 70-year

old wife died of a heart attack at their home. He was placed under sedation with a nurse at his bedside.

However, his daughter Edna, and another family spokesman said Cantor was resting and would be "all right." The comedian himself was treated for several heart attacks since 1953, and precautions were taken Thursday to avoid a new seizure.

It was another shock also for an entertainment industry which only Wednesday paid final respects to actress Marilyn Monroe, dead at 36.

Cantor, also 70, and Ida married June 9, 1914, and had five daughters. His family provided Cantor a seemingly unending series of material and a generation of radio listeners came to know "Ida" through Cantor's theme song of the same name.

Cantor was proud of the fact that his family life contradicted the stereotype of Hollywood - Broadway marriages. He and Ida met when they were only 13, and their courtship survived her father's opposition. He wanted Cantor to go into the clothing business, not show business.

But Cantor became a star in Florenz Ziegfeld's "Midnight Frolics" in 1916 and later in the "Ziegfeld Follies." Despite Cantor's loss of a fortune in the 1929 stock market crash, he retained a top place in show business for the next 40 years.

Mrs. Cantor had suffered four attacks in the past seven years. She had been confined to bed since February,

Noted Senator Dies of Attack

WASHINGTON (UPI) - Sen. Francis Case, JR-S-D, whose scrupulous honesty once forced the veto of a bill he favored, died of a heart attack Friday less than 24 hours after he had participated in debate on the Senate floor.

The 65-year-old legislator, admired by President Kennedy and his congressional colleagues for his integrity and moral courage, succumbed in the Bethesda, Md., Naval Hospital where he had been placed in an oxygen tent.

He was admitted to the hospital at 8 p.m., Thursday night when he complained of "extreme discomfort" while preparing for a speaking engagement. Shortly before he had engaged in Senate debate on executive legislation.

The senator's wife, the former Myrtle Graves of Mitchell, S. D., and his daughter, Mrs. Jane Case Commissioner, were summoned to the bedside. Case, who suffered a minor heart ailment earlier this year, died at 10 a.m.

Cochrane Dies

LAKE FOREST, Ill. (UPI)—Gordon "Mickey" Cochrane, fiery catcher who helped Connie Mack's great depression-era Philadelphia Athletics to two world championships and led the Detroit Tigers to victory in the 1935 World Series, died Thursday after a prolonged illness.

The Hall of Fame member, who played on five pennant winners before a sizzling pitched ball ended his playing career, succumbed at Lake Forest Hospital, a pri-

vate institution where he was admitted Monday.

He was 59 and had been in failing health for years after shuttling around the American League as manager, general manager, coach and scout.

Hospital administrator George Caldwell declined to announce the cause of death. Caldwell said Cochrane was brought to the hospital Monday from his home in nearby Lake Bluff, Ill., and his wife was at the bedside when he died.

Father of Five Killed in Wreck

IRVING -- The father of five Irving children was killed Friday afternoon in a violent one-car accident, just north of the city.

Frank J. Cornwell, 42, a Braniff Airline mechanic, died en route to Parkland Hospital in Dallas. He lived at 305 Thompson with his wife, Joyce, four sons and one daughter. The children range from three to 14 years old.

The accident took place on O'Conner Rd., about one-half mile north of the O'Conner-Charlie O'Conner intersection.

Cornwell stopped at the Wheel Inn Grocery and service station, about a quarter-mile south of the intersection, just previous to the wreck.

Marvin A. Redmon, 40, Wheel Inn proprietor, was the last man to whom Cornwell spoke. The airline mechanic

bought a spark plug from Redmon.

Cornwell died after he hit a curve in the road and lost control of the speeding automobile. Unable to negotiate the turn to the east, he slammed into a shallow ditch on the left side of the road and flipped the vehicle.

He was hurled from the car and smashed into the pavement. Redmon said the automobile apparently ran over the man.

County sheriff's officers investigated the accident, but Irving police Sgt. Bill Drake and accident investigator John McCabe reported to the scene to offer help.

Drake said Cornwell apparently had suffered a severe brain concussion. The man was pronounced dead on arrival by a physician at Parkland.

Man Killed In Shooting Here

A 27-year-old man was killed Saturday morning by a pistol blast in Irving, and Irving police said he may have been the victim of a Russian roulette game.

Dead on arrival at a Dallas hospital was James David (Dave) Crawford, whose present address was unavallable.

Five persons, four women and one man ranging in ages from 21 to 25, were taken into custody for investigation. All were taken to the Dallas

County Jail immediately following the 2 a.m. shooting at 2501 W. Newton Circle.

Facts surrounding the case were still cloudy, police said Saturday afternoon. Detective Perry Stevens, who is making the investigation, was in Dallas most of the day Saturday trying to iron out circumstances.

Sgt. Bill Drake, one of the Irving officers who helped in the early investigation, said Crawford was shot by a .38 calibre special pistol in the right temple. A "dum-dum" slug was used, police said.

Powder burns on the victim indicated the shot was fired from close range.

One of the women taken into custody told police she was at the record player in the W. Newton Circle house when she heard the shot. She turned and saw Crawford on the couch, she said.

Police said the fatal wea-

pon was found to the right of the body on the couch. Crawford was sitting up on the couch, with his hands in his lap, according to police.

One of the men taken into custody admitted the pistol belonged to him.

There was beer all over the house, a policeman said, and one of the women said Crawford shot himself, police indicated.
