Police throughout North Central Texas were on the alert Wednesday for the driver of a 1959 Chevrolet that struck and killed a Grand Prairie matron late Tuesday.

The 60-year-old woman-- Mrs. Luvie Key Parr -- was killed by a hit-and-run motorist after she stepped from a Dallas-Fort Worth bus in the 300 block of West Main in Grand Prairie.

Police said the woman was hurled to the pavement, and two witnesses said the driver of the car drove up the street about a block, turned and looked back, and then sped away.

Only description of the car that witnesses could furnish police was that the car was a 1959 Chevrolet, with apparently a badly smashed up front end. They were unable to say whether the car was driven by a man or woman.

The victim was pronounced dead-on-arrival at Great Southwest Hospital. She was an eight-year resident of Grand Prairie, having moved there from Cordova, Ala.

Killed Wife While Children Watched TV

PASADENA, Tex. (UPI) -- Six of Thomas G. Phillips' seven children stared intently at television, unaware of the real drama being played in the next room.

They hardly noticed when their father left the house after cautioning them:

"Don't bother your mother. She's resting and doesn't want to be disturbed."

Mrs. Mary Helen Phillips, 35, was lying in the bathtub, a nylon stocking knotted around her throat. Her eldest son Mark Allen, 14, found her lifeless body Tuesday

night. Phillips, a 45-year-old taxi driver, told police Wednesday he strangled his wife of 17 years "for the sake of" their children.

Officers found Phillip wandering aimlessly down a fog-shrouded street in Pasadena, a suburb of Houston.

He described the slaying. "I waited until she came home. Then I closed the bedroom door so the children wouldn't hear.

"I grabbed her and choked her with my hands. I dragged her into the bathroom, took off one of her stockings and tied it around her neck.

"I feel no remorse whatsoever."

Phillips told of arguing with his wife over whether their eldest daughter, Marlene Frances, 16, would quit school and mind the smaller children while the mother worked as a night club hostess. Marlene was at a neighbor's baby sitting when the slaying occurred.

Phillips also said, "I was tired of intercepting love letters."

Marlene, Mark Allen and the other youngsters: Rex, 9; Rose Ann, 7; Sheryl Sue, 5; Stacie Jean, 3, and Terry Lynn, 1, were placed in foster homes.

Phillips was held without bond on a murder charge.

Balloonist Piccard Dies On Birthday

MINNEAPOLIS (UPI) -- World-famed balloonist Dr. Jean Felix Piccard died in his home Monday on his 70th birthday.

Funeral services were held at 10 a.m. Wednesday for Piccard, member of a famous family of balloonists including his wife, his twin brother Auguste, and his son, Don, of Northfield, Minn.

Dr. Piccard and his twin brother Auguste made their first balloon flight together in Switzerland in 1913. They were the first two to use a free balloon as a physics laboratory.

In World War I the brothers were in the Swiss Army as civilian consultants, working with captive balloons.

Dr. Piccard then taught at the University of Chicago, University of Lausanne and Massachusetts Institute of Technology and worked for Hercules Powder Co. and Bartol Research Foundation, Swarthmore, Pa., and in 1933 he designed a stratosphere gondola for Dow Chemical Co.

He joined the University of Minnesota faculty as a lecturer on Aeronautical Engineering in 1936 and the following year was appointed as a professor. He retired in 1959.

Dr. and Mrs. Jean Piccard made a stratosphere balloon flight together to an altitude of 57,559 feet Oct. 23, 1934. They were the first individuals to make a stratosphere flight through clouds and live. The purpose of the flight was to

He made a balloon flight to an altitude of two miles from Rochester, Minn., Jan. 13, 1937, which attracted a crowd of about 25,000 persons.

Terrorists Murder American

MEXICO CITY (UPI) — Police said Thursday

armed terrorists, believed to be Castro sympathizers, stabbed and killed a retired California department store clerk and stabbed and robbed his Texas student roommate.

The dead man was identified as Fred Plumley, about 65, a former San Francisco department store worker. The student was Phillip Bennett Jr., 24, San Antonio, Tex.

Bennett, in serious condition, was said to have given police a description of the two armed assailants. One was believed to be an American and the other a Cuban. Police said they had four suspects in custody, including a woman.

Police said Plumley's body was found alongside a wall on which was scrawled, in pencil, "Cuba, si; Yankees, No." They said a later arrival had scrawled under it: "I am a Mexican. Cuba, si; Castro, no."

Bennett said the two men jumped him and Plumley as they entered the apartment, they were sharing.

Fatal Wreck Ends 4-Week Marriage

An Irving bride of four weeks died early Monday morning as a result of third-degree burns received in a three car auto smashup on Steimons Expressway Saturday night.

Funeral services will be held Tuesday at Crescent Heights Baptist Church in Abilene for Mrs. Linda Gale Pope, a resident of Irving only since her marriage to Charles Lee Pope, 703 Metker, four weeks ago.

Mrs. Pope, 20, was riding south on Steimons Freeway with Mrs. Pat Ellison and Mr. Pope when they were hit by a car driven by Marvin Junior Lewis of Dallas. The Lewis car also hit an auto driven by James Arthur Cain of Dallas, but there was only slight damage to the Cain car.

Mrs. Pope and Mrs. Ellison were thrown from the car, their clothing engulfed in flames. Kenneth Bolden, an Irvingite passer by, ripped off his shirt to stop the fire that enshrouded Mrs. Pope, but burns had already scarred 90 per cent of her body.

All three persons in the Pope car were taken to Methodist Hospital, where Mrs.

Pope's death was recorded at 3:20 a.m. Monday. Her husband was discharged later that morning. Mrs. Ellison remained in the hospital in "fair" condition.

Mrs. Pope's body was taken to the Campbell Funeral Home in Dallas, which immediately flew the remains to her home in Abilene. Her husband accompanied others in her family who had driven to Dallas in traveling to Abilene by car.

The Popes had been living at the Rochelle Apartments on Metker for only a month after their marriage. For the last two weeks Mrs. Pope has been a policy typist at the INA insurance company in Dallas.

Pope had been working as an accountant at the Utley Carpet Company in Dallas for five months before he brought his bride to Irving for their marriage. They met at Hardin-Simmons University, from which he graduated and which she attended two years as Miss Linda Gale Shaddix.

Though at INA for only two weeks, Mrs. Pope had already achieved a high reputation as an employe. "She was one of

the finest young girls I've ever worked with," said her supervisor Maxine Presby. "She hadn't been here long, but we had already grown to respect her."
