Longtime Irving figure Jack Johnson, 89, dies after car accident

E.J. "Jack" Johnson, an Irving icon, died Tuesday at 89 at Irving Healthcare System hospital of a heart attack resulting from a Saturday car accident.

Services will be at 2 p.m. Thursday at First Baptist Church in Irving. Burial will follow at Oak Grove Memorial Gardens.

Between 1931 and 1951, Mr. Johnson served Irving in many capacities. He was mayor, a city councilman, a policeman, a school board member and a volunteer firefighter.

From 1953 to 1958, he worked for Dallas County Sheriff Bill Decker. Mr. Johnson then went to the district attorney's office, where he worked as an investigator until 1966. He also served as president of the Irving Chamber of Commerce.

He retired in 1978 after serving 12 years as Irving's constable.

"He had a firm hand, but he was generally fair," said lifelong friend C.J. Range of Irving. "If you had a problem you went to Jack.

"His word was worth something. If you didn't want to know what he had to say, you didn't ask him — because he would tell you."

Mr. Range, 72, was 10 years old when he met Mr. Johnson. In the 1930s, Mr. Johnson owned Irving's only feed store, where Mr. Range would buy food for his family's chickens.

Mr. Johnson was a mentor to many Irving children, Mr. Range said.

"When things failed, you talked to Uncle Jack," he said. "If you needed a nickel, he had a job for you."

After retiring, Mr. Johnson and his wife traveled across the United States by mobile home until health problems disabled him.

Mr. Johnson had a history of heart trouble and wore a pacemaker, said his son, Charles Johnson.

His wife was driving the couple's car when a van broadsided the passenger's side at 9 a.m. Saturday at Story Road and Fifth Street, the son said. The trauma caused the heart attack, he said.

Mr. Johnson's wife and the driver of the van suffered scrapes and bruises, Charles Johnson said.

A member of the Irving Masonic Lodge No. 1218 for more than 50 years, the former mayor also was a charter member of the Irving Rotary Club. In 1993, he was honored with the Irving High Spirited Citizens award.

"He always tried to be part of the solution, not the problem," Mr. Range said.

The most important things in Mr. Johnson's life were his family and his church, he said.

"He had his priorities very well in order," Mr. Range said. "If he wasn't in church on Sunday, you had to find him because something was wrong."

In addition to his son, Mr. Johnson is survived by his wife, Mattie Johnson of Irving; two daughters, Jean Gilliland of Ruidoso, N.M., and Frances Parsons, of Possum Kingdom, Texas; a sister, Beatrice Hudson of Roscoe, Texas; nine grandchildren; and 13 great-grandchildren.

Prisoner hangs himself

Man accused

of attempted

murder puts

head in noose

An Irving man who was found hanging from a wall-mounted light fixture by his pants in the Irving jail Monday night was listed in critical condition Wednesday at Parkland Memorial Hospital.

Juan Jojola, 34, was found by a fellow prisoner at 8:45 p.m. Monday after being excused from break time and allowed by jailers into a cell.

"He had used his pants to hang himself," said David Tull, IPD public information officer. "He tied them to the light fixture that was mounted flush on the wall. He had apparently managed to pull it out enough or manipulate it enough to hang from it."

Jojola had been in the city jail since Saturday after he was arrested for two counts of criminal attempted capital murder stemming from an assault earlier that day. He was staying in the long-term housing section of the jail while Irving police were preparing formal charges, Tull said.

That section of the jail is broken into four pods. In each pod, two rows of cells are stacked on top of each other with a living area, which holds a table, some chairs and a mounted television set, Tull said. The living area is approximately 60 feet by 40 feet, he said. Each of the cells is built to accommodate a different number of prisoners; Jojola shared a cell with three other men, he said.

"The prisoners were let out to walk and stretch in their pod," Tull said. "Everyone was in the common area and then he (Jojola) want-

ed back in his cell early, which is not an uncommon request."

According to police, Jojola was alone in his cell for only minutes.

"The prisoners had been let out for a while and then he (Jojola) contacted the jailer who was in sight and was allowed back into his cell," Tull said. "Just a few minutes later, another prisoner noticed him. We're talking about a very short time span. The jailer was available to do CPR and get him transported to the hospital. The jailer wouldn't have been able to do CPR with some result if he had been left in there a long time."

Although police are continuing to conduct their investigation, Tull said, as far as they know, this was a complete shock to the jailers, as well as the other prisoners. Otherwise, extra precautions would have been taken, he said.

There are policies and procedures in place to help prevent suicides, he said.

"We have specialized cells for prisoners who we're worried about," Tull said. "In this case, we did not have information that would lead us to believe he would be suicidal or would even attempt something like this. He (Jojola) would've been placed in more direct observation. We're always looking for warning signals and when they're spotted, the situation is addressed immediately.

"Unfortunately even with the best policies in place, things like this can happen."

Tull said the jail cells, which are made of all glass and steel, do not have bars. Nothing can be used by a prisoner to hang from the beds, either.

According to Tull, there has not been a death in the Irving jail in approximately four years. The last incident was not a suicide; a prisoner died of alcohol poisoning before police were able to get him medical attention, he said.

Jojola was arrested at 7:45 p.m. Saturday for allegedly shooting Jeff Jordan, 30, of Irving, and stabbing his brother Mark Jordan, 35, also of Irving, in the 600 block of Hilltop Drive at 2:05 a.m.

Both brothers were listed in serious condition at Parkland Memorial Hospital.

Police said initial indications of his motivation stem from the suspect's recent separation from his wife, who was staying with the Jordans. According to police, Jojola shot and stabbed the two men and then forced his estranged wife, 29-year-old Lana Mendenhall, and their 6-year-old son into his vehicle.

After driving around, the suspect released both Mendenhall and the son unharmed.

Police then said Jojola went to his apartment in the 300 block of W. Fifth St. Tactical officers then entered his residence, arrested him without incident and brought him to Irving jail, according to police.

Dallas man arrested for homicides

Dallas resident Kenneth Wayne Fields faces two capital murder charges, one from Irving police and one from Dallas police, for allegedly stabbing to death two of his former girlfriends over the weekend.

Fields, 30, is currently in the Lew Sterrett Justice Center on a \$500,000 bond for capital murder. Irving police also have a hold on him for investigation of capital murder, and David Tull, public information officer with the Irving Police Department, said police plan on filing a capital murder charge later this week.

"Because it involved multiple murders that occurred in a close enough proximity and time, we are able to consider them capital murder," Tull said.

Irving resident Tracie Jones, 20, was found dead Saturday morning in her apartment, with multiple stab wounds to her upper body, Tull said. Dallas resident Vivian Gaines, 33, also was found dead in her apartment Saturday morning, with multiple stab wounds as well as blunt-force trauma to the head and strangulation, said Detective Chris Gilliam of the Dallas Police Department. Police sources said they believe both women had been girlfriends of Fields.

"He was the ex-boyfriend of the Irving woman, and we think he was dating the Dallas woman," Tull said.

Fields had a different residence than Gaines, so police believe they were not living together, Gilliam said. Police are not speculating on why Fields allegedly killed the two

women, especially right after one another.

"We haven't established a motive yet, and we don't know how long he was going out with her," Tull said.

According to Dallas police, a person not involved in the case found Gaines' body at 6 a.m. Saturday in her apartment in the 3800 block of Gannon Lane and notified police. Gaines' head had been struck by an iron, she had been stabbed multiple times and she was strangled, Gilliam said.

According to Irving police, Jones was found dead at 9:43 a.m. in her apartment in the 1000 block of Oakland Drive by a neighbor, who then called police. She suffered several stab wounds to her upper body, but police would not disclose how many times she was stabbed or where specifically she was stabbed, Tull said.

"The neighbor went over to her apartment, and the door was ajar," Tull said. "She knocked on the

door and it opened."

Tull said police would not disclose whether there were signs of a struggle, and he said there was no mention from investigators of forced entry. Gilliam said the same thing with regards to Gaines' murder.

Irving police contacted Dallas police following the discovery of Jones and asked them to look for Fields — Irving police already had identified Fields as a potential suspect, Tull said.

Dallas police, though, had picked up Fields for the homicide of Gaines, Gilliam said.

Fields was arrested at 9:30 a.m. at a Burger King restaurant located in the 7300 block of South Cockrell Hill Road (Fields resided in the 6900 block of the same street), he said.

When asked what led police to believe Fields was the suspect in the case, Gilliam said, "That is part of the investigation that won't be released."
